Special Education Program Description

The major in Special Education is designed to prepare undergraduate candidates to become highly proficient in the delivery of instruction and services to all school aged children and adolescents with exceptionalities. The program consists of a 48 credit hour major plus a 24 credit hour cognate (in lieu of a minor). Candidates are selected each October to begin studies in the subsequent spring semester as a cohort. Most coursework is offered during daytime hours.

Admission Requirements

- Students must have earned a minimum cumulative grade point average of 2.0 or higher for all college or university course work attempted. Students must be in good academic standing at the last college or university attended.
- Required documents are: application for admission, \$30 nonrefundable application fee, and official transcripts from all colleges and universities.

Admission Requirements for the Daniel L. Goodwin College of Education for Special Education

- A spontaneous writing sample and/or interview required at the discretion of the Department.
- A minimum of 20 hours working, volunteering or observing students with disabilities. Documentation must be on agency letterhead.
- A minimum 2.75 GPA
- A minimum 30 semester hours (this can be transfer coursework or courses taken at Northeastern)
- Background check
- **One** of the following test criteria must be met before the anticipated semester of student teaching :
 - Passing scores on the Test of Academic Proficiency (TAP) www.icts.nesinc.com
 - ACT (taken prior to 9/1/2015), composite score of 22 or higher with a minimum score of 19 on Combined English/Writing
 - ACT (taken between 9/1/2015 and 9/9/2016), composite score of 22 or higher with a minimum score of 16 on Writing
 - ACT (taken after 9/9/2016), composite score of 22 or higher with a minimum score of 6 on Writing
 - SAT (taken prior to 3/5/2016), composite score of 1030 (Critical Reading and Mathematics = 1030 or higher) with a minimum score of 450 on Writing
 - SAT (taken after 3/5/2016), composite score of 1110 (Evidence-Based Reading and Writing and Mathematics = 1110 or higher) with a minimum score of 26 on Writing and Language

General Education Requirements

Three options are available to students who plan to complete their General Education requirements at Morton College.

- **Associate of Arts or Associate of Science degree:** Students who transfer with an approved Illinois Community College Board (ICCB) Model Associate of Arts degree will have met Northeastern Illinois University’s General Education requirements. Students who transfer with an Associate of Science degree granted December 2016 or later may need to take one additional Humanities course and one additional Social and Behavioral Sciences course to meet Northeastern’s General Education requirements.
- **Completion of the Illinois Articulation Initiative (IAI):** Students who transfer after completing the Illinois Articulation Initiative (IAI) will have met their General Education requirements.

- The Special Education program selects students in October, and each cohort begins taking major classes in the subsequent spring semester. Students should apply to Northeastern for the fall semester and take EDFN 306 during their first semester. Completion of or enrollment in EDFN 306 is a requirement of being admitted to the Special Education program.
- All students who earn an Associate of Arts Degree from Morton College enter Northeastern with 64 hours of transfer credit, even if they earned less than 64 credit hours. See the [NEIU Transfer Policy](#) for further information.
- Professional Sequence courses are courses that are a part of the Special Education major and are taken in the sequence listed below.
- Teacher Licensure courses are courses required by the State of Illinois to be licensed to teach Special Education.
